The Chelsea Enclave in Manhattan is competing hard to be the destination for families. Their open space, "a central garden oasis with meandering paths, flowers, trees and a lively children's playground" called The Close is a Mecca of kid amenities. There is a playground, tennis court and dog run. And most impressive is "appleseeds," a playground on the building's roof. It helps that the new structure is located on the massive grounds of the General Theological Seminary's Gothic revival-designed campus.
